FROM THE

MAYOR'S OFFICE

I'm extremely proud to be the Mayor of the Isaac region. Our 17 communities may be considered small, but our contribution to the state and country is big, and so much has happened here over the past year. In January, the Queensland Government invested \$40 million to establish the Isaac Resources Excellence Precinct (IREP). This is a partnership project with the Resource's Centre of Excellence in Mackay, where IREP will effectively become their 'stage 3,' focused on skills and training, innovation, and opportunities in both new and existing industries. At the Australia Day Awards, we celebrated hardworking, talented, and community-minded local legends: Amanda Raymond, our Isaac Citizen of the Year from Moranbah, and Ciara Storch, our Young Isaac Citizen of the Year from Dysart, along with incredible volunteers from across the region. We completed community consultation and developed a long-term master plan for Theresa Creek Dam to guide maintenance and upgrades into the future. In June, our St Lawrence Wetlands Weekend attracted nearly 3,000 visitors and earned another gold at the Mackay Isaac Tourism Awards, showcasing Isaac's culture and pride. The town of Glenden has faced its share of challenges, but the latest was a unique one: a contest over water quality. Glenden's dedicated water treatment team entered the town's water in the prestigious Best of the Best Queensland Water Taste Test, a competition that ranks water from across Queensland for its taste. The town's water took out joint first place with Hervey Bay and will now head to national judging. This achievement is a testament to the skill and dedication of our small yet mighty two-person Glenden team. At the local government elections, I heard loud and clear from communities, workers. and industries that investment in our road network is essential to address existing pressures and unlock our region's potential. This is why I've taken on the role of committee chair for Queensland Beef Corridors (QBC). QBC is a collaboration of seven regional councils aimed at sealing key routes for the transport and agricultural sectors. So far, we have secured \$500 million in funding, with \$47.5 million in early works set to begin next year. Throughout the state election, Council advocated strongly to local candidates and decision-makers down south for further investment in upgrades and road maintenance. Here at Isaac Regional Council, half of our \$55.5 million capital works budget is dedicated to fixing roads and bridges. We will continue to advocate to the new state government to make travel safer and easier for everyone in 2025. There is no doubt the whole of Australia is in the grip of a housing affordability and availability crisis. Personally, I find it very disappointing that large-scale industry growth hasn't necessarily translated into growth of our residential housing stock, just more camp room applications. Our Council is proud to be part of the Isaac Affordable Housing Trust (IAHT), and this year they opened 16 new

housing units for essential workers in Moranbah,

with another 14 on the way. IAHT is also working through new development approvals for Clermont. As regional communities, we know the cost-of-living is making it harder for kids to leave home and access higher education. That's why our Council is working tirelessly to establish Country University Centres here in Isaac. This year, we successfully secured \$2 million to fit out a space in Moranbah and build a new centre in Clermont that will provide students studying by distance free access to support staff, equipment, and create social connections. I'd like to thank the incredible, highly skilled volunteer board who are giving their time and guidance to bring this concept to life. It's safe to say I've taken on some new roles this year. I became the District 7 delegate on the Local Government Association of Queensland's (LGAQ) Policy Executive, representing Isaac, Whitsunday, and Mackay. This role allows me to advocate on behalf of our regions and be part of the advisory board to LGAQ. Following this appointment, I was also elected as a Board Member of LGAQ. After more than 12 years in local government, I'm really enjoying contributing to conversations on behalf of the sector. Reflecting on my first year as Mayor, there's much I'm extremely grateful for. One is my newly elected Council team. After three terms in Isaac, it's been energising to have new perspectives, and skill sets at the table and to be working with a team that truly cares for our communities. Three months ago, we welcomed our permanent CEO, Cale Dendle, and his wife Shelley to the region. It's a great privilege to represent an organisation of people who come to work every day to improve lives, and they continue to be a huge source of motivation to me. I'm also grateful for my family's support. Being Mayor means a lot of travel, no set hours, and a different schedule every week. My husband, Blair, has stepped up to manage our life admin as we prepare to send our kids off into the world next year. If you haven't met him already, he's the guy happy to chat while I disappear for 'duties' at most events (something Shelley seems to be a master of as well). I want to thank everyone who has taken the time to welcome me, the Councillors, and our new staff members into communities. The best part of this job is meeting everyday people doing incredible things for our communities, expecting nothing in return. This year has been tough as we come to terms with the loss of people close to the heart of our Council, mining industry, and communities. As we approach the holiday season, let's remember them and cherish their memory. I hope this time of year brings you comfort, peace, and the warmth of cherished moments with mates and loved ones. Wishing you all a joyful and restful holiday season, Merry Christmas, and I look forward to seeing you all in the New Year.

MAYOR'S CHARITY BALL 2024

A 340-strong crowd came together to raise funds for higher education initiatives that will directly benefit residents and industries in the Isaac region.

The Isaac Regional Charity Fund - Mayor's Charity Ball 2024 took place at the Hornery Group Complex in Moranbah on Saturday, August 24, 2024.

Fund director Mayor Kelly Vea Vea thanked industry leaders, businesses, unions and the wider community for their support of the Isaac Country Universities Centre initiative.

"There's no denying that regional residents face greater barriers to accessing tertiary education. In fact, regional and rural students are 20% less likely to pursue tertiary education compared to their metropolitan counterparts," Mayor Vea Vea said.

"It is estimated that 90% of jobs in the next five years will require some form of degree or qualification, yet the national job shortage has driven many to seek employment over education.

"We know the study hubs address a critical gap in support for higher education and vocational training in the Isaac region."

Mayor Vea Vea said the Isaac Regional Charity Fund will make an announcement regarding funds raised for the project after the final tallies are done.

"I can't stress enough how thankful I am to our event partners, sponsors, and guests, this initiative will play a pivotal role in reskilling the workforce and supporting our communities in acquiring future skills across various industries, including health, resources, renewables, agriculture, technology, and critical minerals."

COUNCIL RALLIES QUEENSLAND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO SHAPE A BRIGHTER FUTURE

Isaac Regional Council has achieved a significant milestone with the endorsement of its motions, paving the way to unite all 76 local government areas across Queensland in a shared mission to build a brighter future for every community. At October's 128th Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ) annual conference, Council called for Queensland Government action to address pressing local needs.

Mayor Kelly Vea Vea said local governments today are stretched to new limits, moving beyond traditional roles of roads, rates, and rubbish to address the diverse needs of our communities.

"Our communities depend on us, the most accessible level of government, to guide them through pivotal changes and help reshape their futures," Mayor Vea Vea said.

Acknowledging the challenges that range from mine closures to changing community dynamics, the Mayor underscored the Council's commitment to ensuring prosperous outcomes for every resident.

The Brisbane-staged LGAQ conference provides an

opportunity for the Isaac region to advocate for policies that will positively impact Queensland councils, supported by LGAQ's representation to federal and state governments.

Isaac Regional Council's endorsed motions include:

- Funded Positions in Impacted Councils: Advocating for support to councils facing large-scale developments, including renewable and resource projects, through funded roles to better serve impacted areas.
- Energy Opportunities in Mines: Prioritising energy opportunities in both existing and decommissioned mines to benefit local economies.
- Local Government Representation: Seeking inclusion of local government representation on the Net Zero Economy Agency to ensure regional voices are heard in Australia's energy transition
